## World War 1 Roll of Honour Birmingham City Police Detective Inspector Bertram Arthur Armitage Lance Corporal 4924 1st bttn Coldstream Guards



September 17<sup>th</sup> 1885 Bertram Arthur Armitage was born in Birmingham, the son of Abraham 1850-1922 and Caroline nee Lees 1855-1895. He was one of 6 children. His only brother, served as Private 5580 of 4<sup>th</sup> bttn Royal Berkshire Regiment and sadly died 20<sup>th</sup> July 1919 of pneumonia and is commemorated on the memorial in the military plot at Yardley Cemetery, Birmingham April 2<sup>nd</sup> 1906 Bertram joined Birmingham City Police as a reservist. He was issued with warrant number 8616 and posted to the C Division

December 12<sup>th</sup> 1906 Bertram was awarded a guinea for the arrest of a gas meter thief July 14<sup>th</sup> 1907 Bertram married Phoebe Emily Eliza Greenfield 1884-1946. They had a son whom they named Bertram Arthur, who was born 14<sup>th</sup> December 1909 and who died 1983 in Great Barr, Birmingham. Bertram and Phoebe resided at 47 Tenby Street North, Birmingham 24 November 1909 Bertram was awarded a guinea for stopping a runaway horse 1911 census Bertram was residing with his wife Phoebe, and their son Bertram at 74 Unett Street, Hockley, Birmingham

June 1<sup>st</sup> 1914 Bertram was posted to the R Division to perform duty in the summonsing department August 4<sup>th</sup> 1914 Bertram was recalled to his regiment Coldstream Guards

January 24<sup>th</sup> 1915 Bertram, whilst at Boulogne, was severely reprimanded for misconduct by attempting to send personal clothing to England contrary to orders

September 9<sup>th</sup> 1915 An article in Picture World reported 'A hero of Mons' Lance Corporal B A Armitage No 1 Co 1st bttn Coldstream Guards has just returned to the front after spending his first weeks leave since the outbreak of war. Armitage, in company with several other members of the City Police Force were among the first batch of reservists to be called up and like Corp Albert Coakley of 'A' Division went to France with the Expedition Force. In the retreat from Mons Armitage had the misfortune to severely sprain his ankle and has since acted as a clerk with the Headquarters Staff at Havre

November 27<sup>th</sup> 1915 Bertram re-joined Birmingham City Police from HM Forces and was posted to the CID on the R Division

December 31st 1923 Bertram was promoted to Detective Sergeant

January 7<sup>th</sup> 1925 Bertram was awarded a book prize

July1st 1930 Bertram was promoted to Detective Inspector

July 31<sup>st</sup> 1933 Bertram resigned on superannuation

October 22<sup>nd</sup> 1967 Bertram sadly died whilst residing in Great Barr, Birmingham and his estate was

left to his son Bertram, an accountant
