## World War 1 Birmingham City Police PC D40 Lawrence KENNY

Lance Corporal P/911 29<sup>th</sup> Division Military Mounted Police Died in Egypt 9<sup>th</sup> August 1915

Lawrence was born circa 1882 in St Giles, London and was a resident in Bordesley Green, Birmingham

Lawrence joined Birmingham City
Police on two occasions, firstly on 12<sup>th</sup>
June 1909, with warrant number 8115 he
resigned shortly after having been
disciplined in June 1912, and he rejoined on 12<sup>th</sup> August 1914 as a 32-yearold. Lawrence served on the D Division
with warrant number 8522 and collar
number PC D40

In 1911, Lawrence was recorded as residing at Aston Manor police Station aged 29

Birmingham City Police records dated 25<sup>th</sup> January 1915 stated

PC D40 Lawrence KENNY is one of many constables to attend Great Brook Street Barracks on Wednesday next at 2.45pm for the purpose of being tested as to their riding qualifications.

The same records dated 4<sup>th</sup> February 1915 stated

Lawrence is one of many constables who have been selected for the Military Mounted Police and who will be struck off the strength of the Force on the 7th February.

These men will report themselves for attestation and produce their Army parchments, marriage certificates, and the birth certificates of their children at the Recruiting Office, James Watt Street, at 10 am on Monday 8th inst. They will then report themselves to the Provost Marshal, Aldershot on Tuesday 9th February.

Lawrence resigned on 9<sup>th</sup> February 1915 to join the Military Mounted Police in Birmingham

Lawrence was drafted to Egypt and died of enteric fever on 9<sup>th</sup> August 1915 at the number 17 general hospital in Alexandria

Lawrence is buried Alexandria (Chatby)
Military and War Cemetery, Egypt.
